
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# Mayor's Message

## Dan Reese

I write this from my home, not exactly the place I thought I would be spending March, April, and probably May. We are in the midst of events we will never forget. We even have some new phrases like “Social Distancing” and “Stay Home, Stay Safe” orders. I have learned more about video teleconferencing than I ever knew before. Who really knew what “Zoom” and “WebEx” were before March. I have been on conference calls with our Congressman Henry Cuellar, Governor Abbott, County Judge Wolff, and our County Commissioner Tommy Calvert - just to name a few.

**Keeping You Safe.** Let me say from the start – your City staff is laser focused on their main job, to keep you safe. We are keenly aware that the average age of the Citizens of Windcrest put us in a higher risk group. As of this writing, there are NO confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the City of Windcrest. We have a first class team and they are doing an excellent job. Many are staying home, but our First Responders are out there every day doing everything they can to keep this virus from us.

**State of Emergency.** We declared an emergency on March 16, 2020. From that day on, our Emergency Management Coordinator, Chief Dan Kramer, our City Manager, Rafael Castillo and I have been in constant communication keeping up to date with the effects of the virus and taking appropriate actions to keep everyone safe. In large part, we are following the lead of County Judge Nelson Wolff.

**Keeping our Government going.** While we are in the midst of this crisis, the day to day operations of the City needs to continue and it is.

- City Council meetings are being held online. We put instructions about how to join the meetings on our City website, our City Facebook page and in print on the announcement board just outside the main entrance in City Hall. If you have any questions, you can call our City Secretary Rachel Dominguez at 210-655-0022.
- City staff is mostly working from home but they can be reached at their regular phone number (they have been forwarded).
- Police and Fire are on duty 24/7. They are taking some added precautions for you and for their safety.
- Public Works continues to keep the infrastructure of our City in excellent shape, all while maintaining necessary precautions.

**Economic Impact.** This crisis will clearly have an impact on Windcrest economically. At this time we just don't know the extent of that impact.

- We expect to get some indication in mid-May based on the sales tax numbers that will be reported then.
- At the City Council meeting on April 6, the City Manager detailed some of the actions that he and the Finance Team are taking to monitor the situation. We are clearly moving forward, but we are being very cautious with your tax dollars.
- Our Economic Development Corporation (EDC) has recognized that we need

to be proactive in supporting our local businesses. These businesses not only provide us with services, but they employ our community. - I witnessed citizens buying gift cards from our local businesses and giving them to our First Responders.
- We had a group set up a "drive by" at our local nursing home to bring some joy to those residents and know they are not forgotten.
- Our Public Relations Director, Liz Dick, is coordinating our efforts to volunteer to help and for those who need assistance with getting supplies. You can reach Liz at 210-383-4301.

## A Message From Fire Marshal Zelenak

### Clothes Dryer Safety

Doing laundry is most likely part of your everyday routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent a clothes dryer fire in your home.

- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.
- Make sure to clean the lint filter before each load of laundry. Remove all lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating, also check for birds nest if the vent is damaged.
- Once a year having your air exhaust vent pipe cleaned to remove any lint build up is highly recommended.
- Keep the area around your clothes dryer clean of things that will burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies, and clothing, etc.
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed.

Rest assured as soon as things settle down, we will reschedule everything. One thing that has not and will not change is the mission of our department. The Windcrest Police Department's mission is to enhance the quality of life in our community and provide the community with a safe and fear free environment in which to live, work, and play.

One program we have instituted during these times is welfare checks for elderly citizens in our community that have no one to check on them while the "Stay Home, Stay Safe" declaration is in effect. We are proud that our citizens are following the orders of the President of the United States, Governor of the State of Texas, and the Mayor of the City of Windcrest. As of this writing we are unaware of any positive COVID-19 cases in our town.

Your police department will continue serving our great community, however, the way we serve has been adjusted somewhat during this pandemic. We will now attempt to handle as many calls as possible over the phone so as not to have unnecessary contact with our citizens. We will continue going to the calls where our presence is required or requested but we will attempt to handle these calls outside of buildings and in the open air. This is for the benefit of our citizens and police officers alike.

This, too, will eventually pass and we will recover. Do your part! As always, please stay safe and virus free!

Happy new month, I hope everyone is enjoying all the beautiful blooming flowers. While everyone is out working on the yard, please remove any clutter that snakes may hide underneath. Remember to also clean your backyard. Don't forget – *It shall be unlawful for any owner, lessee, occupant, or any person in charge of any premises occupied or used for residential, business, or pleasure purposes in the City of Windcrest, to allow the same to be kept in an unsanitary condition.*

**Sec. 28-115 Responsibility for alley maintenance.**

The owner and the resident of property adjacent to an alley are jointly responsible for maintaining the necessary clearances of alleys and keeping alleys in a passable, sightly, and sanitary condition.

Please make an effort to clean your dirty swimming pool to keep it free from mosquitos. Also, protect your swimming pool with a fence that is at least four feet high and that has a latched gate that cannot be opened by a child, or a cover over the entire swimming pool that cannot be removed by a child. Escaping is a serious problem for both you and your dog, as it can have tragic consequences. If your dog is running loose, he is in danger of being hit by a car, being injured in a fight with another dog, or being hurt in a number of other ways. Additionally, you are liable for any damage or injury your dog may cause and you may be required to pay a fine if he is picked up by an animal control agency. In order to resolve an escaping problem, you must determine not only how your dog is getting out, but also why he is escaping.

- Walk your dog daily. It's good exercise.
- Teach your dog to fetch a ball or Frisbee and practice with him as often as possible.
- Teach your dog a few commands and/or tricks.
- Take an obedience class.
- Toys filled with treats, to keep your dog busy when you're not home.
- Keep your dog inside when you're unable to supervise him.

An intact male or female dog is motivated by a strong, natural drive to seek out for dogs. It can be very difficult to prevent an intact dog from escaping, because his motivation to do so is very high.

Have your male dog neutered. Have your female dog spayed.

## WEDC Helps Businesses through the COVID-19 Crisis

By early March, the WEDC Board knew that the Coronavirus was going to affect life in Windcrest and throughout the country. What we did not know until the third week of March was that citizens would be asked to stay home, that our way of doing business would change dramatically, and that the crisis would put even more strain on local businesses than we could ever imagine.

The Board wanted to focus on current projects and not lose momentum, but also provide as much information and assistance to Windcrest businesses as possible. The first action ordered was to gather information from all businesses, if possible in order to find out if they were allowed to stay open under the declaration and identify those that were going to make the incredible effort to continue operating. We also wanted to identify changes in operations such as limited menus, curbside service, and expanded delivery services-possibly through third-party delivery vendors. Board members and staff began to call individual businesses to gather the information and provide information the Fire Chief needed for possible FEMA assistance. All Windcrest businesses were called and those that were planning to stay open in some capacity were highlighted on our social media platforms- WEDC Facebook page and the WEDC website. A complete list of businesses remaining open is on the WEDC website, and we continue to update it as changes occur daily.

The businesses were also told that WEDC could help with SBA or disaster loans being proposed by the Federal Government. Information on the new loan programs was posted on our Facebook page and website, followed by a direct mail piece sent to all Windcrest businesses outlining the financial assistance which has been funded.

Finally, the Board funded a street level campaign where an OPEN FOR BUSINESS sign was placed in front of businesses along Walzem road and the IH-35 access road to draw attention to the food establishments continuing to operate in this difficult environment. Board members also began to visit area businesses and published Facebook live videos about the establishment and its owner or manager. The videos are available to view on the WEDC Facebook page.

As of the writing of this article the “Stay Home, Stay Safe” declaration is still in effect and we are still not certain how long this new way of doing business would last. What is certain is that the WEDC and its Board will continue to provide any assistance we can to help our local business and our economy.

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## General Summer Safety Concerns

Hot weather can make anyone feel uncomfortable, and your dog is no exception. Here are some safety concerns for responsible dog owners:

- Never leave your dog unattended in direct sunlight or in a hot, parked car. When it's only 80 degrees outside, the inside of a car can heat up to more than 120 degrees in just minutes. Heatstroke can occur and lead to brain damage or death.
- Signs of heatstroke are panting, drooling, rapid pulse, and fever. Immediately immerse the dog in cool water and seek emergency veterinary assistance.
- Provide your dog with fresh water to drink. Ice cubes and frozen chicken or beef broth encourage your dog to take in more fluids and help keep it cool. You can also feed your dog wet dog food during the summer to increase its fluid intake. Standing water, such as puddles, can also be dangerous for dogs to drink due to the presence of antifreeze or other chemicals.
- All dogs should have proper identification at all times. The AKC suggests a collar with an ID tag, along with a tattoo or a microchip. Keep your dog on a leash when he is outdoors to prevent accidents and injuries.
- Try to avoid strenuous exercise with your dog on extremely hot days and refrain from physical activity when the sun's heat is most intense. Be careful walking your dog. When it's hot outside, it's a good idea to walk your dog either in the morning or in the evening, when temperatures are lower. You should refrain from walking your dog during the heat of the day. Press your hand onto surfaces for 30 seconds to test them before allowing your dog to walk on them. If it is painful for you, it will be painful for your dog.
- Ticks, fleas, mosquitoes, flies, and other insects are at their peak during the summer months. Talk to your veterinarian about appropriate protection such as collars, sprays, shampoos, dips, and other products.
- White, light-colored, and thinly coated dogs have an increased risk of sunburn. Sunburn causes pain, itching, peeling, and other problems.

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# The Thrills and Chills of Yardwork

OK, so maybe it's no theme park. But if you use your imagination, your landscape can be like a riveting roller coaster ride of tasks to tackle — especially if you're in desperate need of an escape from the monotony of self-isolation.

And while (almost) everything you've ever wanted to know about gardening can be found at [GardenStyleSA.com](http://GardenStyleSA.com), I've compiled this quick-reference list of activities to get your front and back yard in tip top shape (and prepped for our WaterSaver Coupons, in case you haven't applied yet).

Of course, continue to mind your social distancing, wear a face mask if necessary and wash your hands often for at least 20 seconds each time.

## Roses

- Prune all remaining dead and diseased stems.
- Spray a light mixture of water and neem oil.
- Cover the area beneath the canopy with a thin layer of mulch or mulch and compost mixture.

## Herbs

- Remove all spent cool season herbs such as cilantro, chives, mint and dill, but leave a few dill sprigs for the swallowtail butterflies.
- Later in April, begin planting warm season herbs including basil, oregano, thyme and lemon balm. Hint: herbs grow well in containers in full sun or slightly partial shade.
- Hand water to keep herbs moist, but not wet.

## Lawns

- Mow, mow and mow again. Mowing the lawn one to two times a week will kill the cool season weeds and encourage new grass growth.
- Apply a slow release 3-1-2 ratio fertilizer in the third week of April. Even better, use an organic product or plain compost, which has additional benefits of carbon.
- Water once a week; any more than that and you're wasting water.

Lastly, spread high quality compost over your beds and lawn — ¼-inch will do.
